THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT March 23rd, 2025

The First Reading tells how God appeared to Moses in the burning bush and revealed His name as Yahweh (I Am Who I Am). God has heard the cries of His oppressed people, and sends Moses to liberate them. It is a turning point in the Old Testament. It leads to the Exodus and beyond. In the Gospel we see how Jesus rejected the popular belief that accidents which befall people are inflicted by God as punishment for sin. Still, sin calls for repentance. And Jesus tells the Jews that they will lose the promises unless they repent. The barren fig tree symbolizes the barren state of Israel. But God is patient. There is still time to repent, though that time is getting short. The role of Moses prefigures the role of Jesus. Through Moses God saved His people, Israel, from slavery in Egypt. We are the new people of God, saved through the waters of baptism from the slavery of sin, and now enroute under the leadership of Christ to the promised land of eternal life. We too are fed with food "from heaven", namely, the Eucharist! In the Letter to the Romans St. Paul says in spite of all God had done for them, most of the Israelites were not pleasing to God. Christians must not think that just because they have received the sacraments they are automatically saved.

History of the Catholic Church (#67) – The Emperor Constantine bestowed important privileges on the Christian clergy. They were recognized as a distinct social class and exempted from military service and forced labor. He invested the judicial decisions of the bishop with civil authority. He modified the Roman Law in the direction of Christian values. Sunday, the day when Christians assembled, was made a day of rest. Sexual offenses, such as adultery, concubinage, and prostitution, were treated more severely. On the other hand, a more humane attitude was shown toward slaves (their families could not be broken up), children, orphans, and widows. Under Constantine the Church was firmly set on the road to union with the state. The Emperor was thus in a real sense the architect of the Middle Ages.
