The Advent liturgy relives in a microcosmic way the history of Israel, viewing in through the eyes of Christian faith. It shows that all of that history was pointing and leading towards Jesus. He was the One who fulfilled the messianic prophecies. As for today's reading – the First is a poem (written by a returned exile) entreating God to come and save His people. It recalls God's past goodness, and candidly acknowledges the ingratitude and sinfulness of His people. The Second Reading and the Gospel talk about the final coming of Christ, something the early Christians believed was imminent. For the faithful, the Lord's coming is not something to fear. They are urged to live in such a way as to be always ready to meet the Lord. These words are addressed to us now.

History of the Catholic Church (#13) – Thanks to the Jerusalem decision allowing freedom to the Gentiles and thanks to the incredible labors of St. Paul and other missionaries, the Church spread with remarkable rapidity. We know that by the year 59, for instance, St. Paul felt that he had exhausted his possibilities in the eastern Mediterranean. "All the way along, from Jerusalem to Illyricum, I have preached Christ's Good News to the utmost of my capacity" (Rm 15:19). And we may reasonably infer that those regions mentioned that he himself had not evangelized were evangelized by others. St. Paul set his sights now on Spain, the oldest Roman province, and the main center of Roman civilization in the western Mediterranean. But before he could set sail for the West, there was a matter of critical importance to attend to. He must visit Jerusalem again to deliver the collection for the poor that he had taken up among his communities. It would also provide the occasion, he hoped, for reaching full agreement with the Church there as he entered on a new phase of his missionary effort. It is with this in mind that he penned his great letter to the Romans, which he intended for Jerusalem as much as for Rome and which contained his mature reflection on the central issue of the Law vs. the Gospel.
