FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT March 10th, 2024

The First Reading shows how God remained faithful to His people in spite of their infidelities. God's promises were not nullified by the sins of His people. It was because of their sins that God allowed His people to be exiled to Babylon. But His mercy is seen in their home-coming. This leads into the Gospel. God's love and mercy are seen in the fact that He sent His Son to save us. Jesus came into the world as a light. Sadly, some preferred darkness to the light, thus sealing their own condemnation. Judgment is not passed by God; people judge themselves by their response to the light. The reading from Ephesians stresses the enormity of the love God has shown in Christ. It makes it clear that we owe our salvation, not to our own efforts, but to the goodness of God.

History of the Catholic Church (#24) – One of the best-known mystery religions is that of Cybele, the Great Mother. Like the others it gives evidence of having originated in fertility rites associated with the vegetative rhythms of nature – death in winter and resurrection in the spring. Cybele, the mother of all gods and men, had as her companion the semidivine Attis, who betrayed her and died. The Great Mother, however, restored him to life and deified him, making him immortal. This myth was celebrated in two main rituals: in the taurobolium, the faithful reenacted the death of Attis by slaying a bull, then sprinkling themselves in his blood and even drinking it; in the spring festival of Attis's resurrection, they engaged in frenzied dancing while lacerating themselves and sprinkling the blood on a pine tree symbolizing Attis, until in a final ecstasy some of men would hurt themselves in imitation of their god. By participating in such rituals, the devotee believed himself regenerated, liberated from guilt, and reborn as a new person, sharing in the divinity and immortality of his gods. But the mystery religion that proved to be most serious rival of Christianity, however, was... Mithraism.
