

## FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT

December 18<sup>th</sup>, 2022

All three readings deal with the identity of “the One who was to come”. The identity of the child was vaguely glimpsed in the Old Testament. Isaiah talked about the coming of a very special child (First Reading). But there is no reason to believe that he knew just how special that child would be! No prophecy is fully understood until after its fulfilment. St. Matthew shows that Isaiah’s prophecy was fulfilled in Jesus, and in a far greater way than the prophet could ever have imagined. The New Testament reveals the true identity of this special Child – Jesus! The Second Reading and the Gospel make it clear that Jesus was the Son of David. This was so because Joseph, His legal guardian, was descended from the line of David. But He is more than that... He is the Son of God! A happy & fruitful 4th week of Advent to you!

**Our Saint of the Week: St. John of Kanty (1390 - 1473)** – John was a country lad who made good in the big city and the big university of Kraków (Jagiellonian University, est. 1364), Poland. After brilliant studies he was ordained a priest and became a professor of theology. The inevitable opposition which saints encounter led to his being ousted by rivals and sent to be a parish priest at Olkusz. An extremely humble man, he did his best, but his best was not to the liking of his parishioners. Besides, he was afraid of the responsibilities of his position. But in the end he won his people’s hearts. After some time he returned to Kraków and taught Scripture for the remainder of his life. St. John was a serious man, and humble, but known to all the poor of Kraków for his kindness. His goods and his money were always at their disposal, and time and again they took advantage of him. He kept only the money and clothes absolutely needed to support himself. He slept little, ate sparingly, and took no meat. He made a pilgrimage to Jerusalem, hoping to be martyred by the Turks. Later St. John made four subsequent pilgrimages to Rome, carrying his luggage on his back. When he was warned to look after his health, he

was quick to point out that, for all their austerity, the fathers of the desert lived remarkably long lives. St. John of Kanty is a typical saint: He was kind, humble, and generous, he suffered opposition and led an austere, penitential life. Most Christians in an affluent society can understand all the ingredients except the last: Anything more than mild self-discipline seems reserved for athletes and ballet dancers. Christmas at least is a good time to reject self-indulgence. St. John pray for us!
