

FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

January 30th, 2022

The First Reading tells of the call and commissioning of the prophet Jeremiah. Jeremiah never wanted to be a prophet and was overwhelmed by the sheer burden of it. He stands out as a lonely figure whose mission seemed to have failed. He is the supreme example, until Jesus, of the triumph of failure. The Gospel is a continuation of last Sunday's reading. We see the reaction to the homily Jesus gives in the synagogue at Nazareth. The people cannot believe that the words of Isaiah could apply to Him, the humble son of Mary and Joseph. On hearing that the benefits they have rejected will be offered to the Gentiles, the people rise up in fury and attempt to do away with Jesus. This foreshadows the ultimate fate of Jesus; but His hour has not yet come. St. Paul has been speaking of the gifts and charisms. But here (Second Reading) he stresses the supreme importance of love. Without love all these gifts are useless.

Our Saint of the Week: St. Agatha (230-251) – as in the case of St. Agnes, another virgin-martyr of the early Church, almost nothing is historically certain about this saint except that she was martyred in Sicily during the persecution of Emperor Decius in 251. Legend has it that St. Agatha, like St. Agnes, was arrested as a Christian, tortured, and sent to a house of prostitution to be mistreated. She was preserved from being violated, and was later put to death. She is claimed as the patroness of both Palermo and Catania. The year after her death, the stilling of an eruption of Mt. Etna was attributed to her intercession. As a result, apparently, people continued to ask her prayers for protection against fire. The scientific modern mind winces at the thought of a volcano's might being contained by God because of the prayers of a Sicilian girl. Still less welcome, probably, is the notion of that saint being the patroness of such varied professions as those of foundry workers, nurses, miners and Alpine guides.

Yet, in our historical precision, have we lost an essential human quality of wonder and poetry, and even our belief that we come to God by helping each other, both in action and prayer? St. Agatha pray for us!
