FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT February 18th, 2024

The First Reading introduces the theme of covenant. In it we are told of the first in a series of patriarchal covenants which serve as a preparation for the covenant at Sinai. That in turn prepared the way for the new covenant God formed <u>with humanity</u> in and through Jesus Christ. In the Gospel we hear of Jesus' victorious struggle against evil. St. Mark makes no reference to the fast of Jesus. In this first struggle Jesus is not God-forsaken as He will be at His last. Like Noah, the Christian is saved by passage through water – the waters of baptism (Second Reading). It is through our baptism that we enter into the new covenant (relationship) with God, and that Christ's victory over sin and death is communicated to us.

History of the Catholic Church (#21) – Tiberius (d. 37), Gaius Caligula (d. 41), Claudius (d. 54), and Nero (d. 68) were Emperors whose personal lives were darkened by bizarre, macabre incidents and crimes. The atmosphere of their courts was heavy with intrigue and foul suspicion. Tiberius, under whom Christ was crucified, was a competent soldier but an unhappy Emperor – crushed by the discovery that his son, Drusus, had been murdered by his own most trusted adviser, Sejanus. His nerves shattered, Tiberius retired to Capri, where he spent the last years of his reign. Caligula was a mentally deranged megalomaniac who was assassinated. Claudius, weak in body and will, was dominated by his wife, Agrippina, who finally poisoned him to make room for her son, Nero. Then Nero in turn murdered her and began a reign of terror that took the lives of many of Rome's outstanding leaders before he himself was forced to commit suicide. This state of affairs provided a great opportunity for a religion that could help fill the spiritual vacuum experienced by so many. And it was Christianity that made the most of this opportunity.
