FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER April 21st, 2024

From the earliest days the Apostles encountered hostility from the Jewish leaders just as Jesus Himself had. Even so, the First Reading shows Peter fearlessly proclaiming the resurrection of Jesus. He asserts that the stone they rejected (Jesus) has become the cornerstone of a new building (covenant). The risen Christ is the One and only Saviour. The Gospel presents Jesus as the Good Shepherd who knows His sheep intimately and is known by them. Unlike the hireling, He is willing to die to protect His sheep. In the Second Reading John talks about the wonderful love God has shown for us by making us His children. Our future state will be like that of the glorified Jesus. This reading invites us to rejoice in our status as God's adopted children. If there is a theme in all readings perhaps it is this: the great love God has shown us in what He has done for us in Jesus, the Good Shepherd and our One and only Saviour.

History of the Catholic Church (#29) – Christians saw to the support of teacher and officials, of widows and orphans, of the sick and infirm and the disabled. Christians dedicated themselves to prisoners and people languishing in the mines, to those hit by great calamities, and to the care of poor people needing burial; they furnished work to the unemployed, took care of brethren on journeys, and saw to the need of churches in poverty or in any peril. There is indeed no doubt that the Christian Gospel led the world to a higher stage of morality. Its social and ethical dynamism exerted a powerful influence on potential converts. Two of its greatest thinkers in the second century, Tatian and Justin, for instance, were converted, as they acknowledged, by the moral attractiveness of the Christians they knew.
