We shouldn't turn salt and light into allegories. They are just images. Both images are making the same point: Jesus' disciples have a vital role to play in the world through their good deeds. When the disciples stop witnessing through their deeds, they become as useless as salt that has lost its taste or a lamp that doesn't give light.

[History of the Catholic Church \(#103\)](#) – From this practice it was only a short step to monasticism, wherein the ascetic secluded himself completely from society by going out into the wilderness or desert. As far as we know, the first one to do this was St. Anthony of Egypt, who was deeply moved when he happened to hear the text: “There is one thing further you must do. Sell all you have and give to the poor. You will have treasure in heaven. Then come and follow me.” He took up an abode in complete solitude on the east bank of the Nile. As others gathered around him, a large populace of monks formed in the deserts south of Alexandria. Some practiced lives of complete solitude except for a weekly assembly and liturgy, while others lived in communities. Pachomius (ca. 290), another Egyptian, originated another form of monasticism that was characterized by a high degree of organization: work, study of Scripture, and prayer were integrated into a balanced daily schedule.
