THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME October 29th, 2023

By rabbinical count, the Law (the first five Books of the Old Testament) consisted of some 613 commandments. The question as to which commandment was the greatest was one frequently discussed among the rabbis. Jesus was asked to name one, but responded by naming two. That is because, for Him, the second followed directly and necessarily from the first. Love of neighbour arises out of love of God. Both commandments are found in the Old Testament. What is new is not the fact that Jesus brought these two commandments together, but that He made them of equal importance.

History of the Catholic Church (#8) – For Paul, the very essence of the Gospel was at stake in the controversy over circumcision; to require Gentiles to practice the Jewish Law would be synonymous to saying that faith in the Risen Lord was not enough for salvation, that observance of the Law was also necessary. Paul's understanding of the Gospel as a liberation from the Law was not some academic theory he had worked out in a study; it was at the very heart of the conversion experience that had changed him from a dedicated devotee of the Law to an ardent disciple of Jesus. As a zealous rabbi, student of the great Gamaliel at Jerusalem and subsequently a figure of importance in the synagogues there, Paul could say: "I stood out among other Jews of my generation for the traditions of my ancestors." He had even become a chief persecutor of the disciples and was present at the stoning of Stepen (probably the first Christian martyr). But then spiritual lighting struck!
