FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT March 30th, 2025

A clear theme runs through all three readings. God's mercy to sinners. In the First Reading we have the beautiful words God spoke to His people: "I have taken the shame of Egypt away from you." The shame of sin and the darkness of slavery are behind them. The years of wandering in the desert are over; they have come to the promised land. A new era was about to begin. They mark their homecoming by celebrating anew the feast of Passover. This reminds us of the home-coming of the prodigal son (Gospel). His shame is behind him also. His years of wandering are over and he returns home to a warm welcome and a great feast. A new and bright future lies ahead of him. Jesus told the parable in response to the criticism of the Pharisees that He was too lenient toward sinners. They were meant to see themselves in the older son. For St. Luke the "Pharisees" are righteous Christians, for whom God's mercy to sinners is unfair and scandalous. The Second Reading stresses how God has reconciled us to Himself through Christ, not holding our faults against us. The task of the Church is to bring the benefits won by Christ to all people.

History of the Catholic Church (#68) – This alliance with the state profoundly influenced every aspect of the Church's thought and life. It carried many advantages, but it also entailed some serious drawbacks: infringements on the Church's freedom as civil authorities exploited the relationship for political purposes; mass conversions where social conformity was the chief motivating factor; the widening of the gap between clergy and laity thanks to the official status conferred on them; persecution of dissenters as a menace to unity of the state. The Church would never be the same again – for better and for worse – and so Constantine's conversion is certainly one of the greatest turning points in the history of the Church and of the world.
