TWENTY-EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME October 15th, 2023

Isaiah uses the image of a banquet to describe the fulness of life that God wants to bestow, not just on Israel, but on all the peoples of the earth. Jesus uses the same image in His parable. In its original, simpler form, the parable made the point that those to whom the invitation was first sent (the Jews) rejected it, and their place has been taken by others (the Gentiles). The details about the sending of troops and burning of the city refer to the destruction of Jerusalem in 70 A.D., which was seen as a consequence of the refusal of the Jewish leaders to listen to Jesus. But the new wedding guests (Christians) will suffer the same fate as Israel if they/we don't listen to Jesus and produce the fruits of good works.

MASS SCHEDULE

History of the Catholic Church (#6) – the spread of the Church beyond Jerusalem occurred very gradually as the first disciples carried their message to the numerous Jewish communities scattered along the Mediterranean coast. At first they confined their evangelizing efforts to their fellow Jews, no doubt in conformity with the practice of Jesus Himself, who said He had come to preach to "the lost sheep of the house of Israel." The first group to break with this custom were probably some Jewish dissidents with strong Hellenistic ties and unorthodox views on the Jewish Temple worship. Their leader Stephen, the deacon, was arrested and denounced to the Sanhedrin for speaking against the Temple. When questioned by the high priest, he launched into a polemic against his fellow Jews whom he blasted as "stubborn people, with… pagan hearts and pagan ears" (Acts 7:51). Stepen was stoned to death, and his martyrdom triggered a general persecution; his followers sought refuge elsewhere and began to preach the Gospel wherever they traveled. It was at Antioch, it seems, that they took the revolutionary step that would have momentous consequences for the spread of the Church and the history of the world. Here they made this city the center of missionary work among the Gentiles. And here the followers of Christ were named Christians.
